2007 for the **PFMC**

In much prayer and discussions, we have reached some very difficult decisions. It saddens us that 2007 will see the cessation of *PFMC* operations at 61 Cooper Road, Voorhees, NJ 08043.

As you know the tragic events and aftermath of *September 11, 2001* have taken a toll on the citizens of this great nation. The non-profit organizations dedicated to promulgation of faith and morals have lost a great deal of their support. The *PFMC* is one of those non-profit organizations.

Kathleen and Keith Werner have exhaustively tried to continue the operations of the *PFMC* at Epiphany House, 61 Cooper Road, Voorhees, NJ 08043. The monthly donations from others rarely exceeded *10 percent* of the monthly cost of operations which averages around \$7000 per month. Now we must sell the property at 61 Cooper Road, Voorhees, NJ 08043.

We have prayerfully considered the announcements printed below. Please pray that the transition will go smoothly. Here are some of the specifics:

- Following the *February 2007 PFMC* Retreat Conference, large Annual *PFMC* Retreat Conferences will cease. We encourage everyone reading this newsletter and who have known us these *18 years* of ministry to go to this extremely important event. Enclosed is the last issue of the BLUE information packet with reservation forms. Please fill out a form and submit it to the *PFMC* as soon as possible. Reserve your hotel room immediately with the CLARION HOTEL.
- Activities in Epiphany House will continue to be scheduled as private or parish groups request until the final decision is made to put the property up for sale on the real estate market. This will probably be in late September 2007.
- The contents of **Epiphany House**, i.e., furniture, files, inventory, etc., will be made available to anyone who wishes to bid on them. A list will be kept with names and bids. When the decision is made to vacate the premises the contents will be transferred to those who want them with the highest bidder winning each item. The rest will be disposed of properly. We can not afford to rent storage space so stop by and bid.
- This periodical, "*The PILGRIM*," will continue until such time as facilities for publishing, assembly, and mailing are no longer available. These will probably **NOT** be available after the sale of **61 Cooper Road**, **Voorhees**, **NJ 08043**. The frequency of publication will be reduced as necessary as will the size of the mailing list. This latter means that those who do not regularly contact us will be dropped from the mailing list. We have been mailing to all parishes within the **Roman Catholic Province of New Jersey** for many years. We have shifted to **FAX** notification of events to the parishes and will cease paper delivery after this issue.

We continue to ask for your donations to keep the *PFMC* operations going for at least the next nine months. We are still looking for guidance as to what to do with the *PFMC* operations after the sale of **61**

Cooper Road is completed. See article **AFTER** 2007 for the **PFMC** below. We hope that all can be accomplished in peace. Have a blessed 2007 and please pray for all the volunteers at the **PFMC**.

AFTER 2007 for the PFMC

Kathleen will continue her work in Healing Prayer with Keith in Intercessory Prayer.

The base of operations may still be called the *PFMC* but it will not be at **61 Cooper Road** and probably not in their private home.

The support for **PFMC** operations set up in **Epiphany House** may be moved to a new location or completely sold with other contents. Decisions will have to be made on phones, computers, etc. particularly regarding the handling of requests for intercession.

As decisions are made and plans formulated they will be published in *"The PILGRIM"* with a complete rundown in the last printing of *"The PILGRIM."* If you wish to continue receiving *"The PILGRIM"* we ask for regular contact and monthly donations of at least *\$3*. There has been no subscription fee for all the years of periodical publication.

Over the last *18 years*, we have ministered to people seeking guidance, prayer, or help. We have done our best to be God's instruments in this way. We will continue to be available to speak on past pilgrimages, and to assist anyone in setting up their own pilgrimage to holy shrines, including **Medjugorje**.

In our library there are many photo books of past pilgrimages. If you wish to look at them, please come to the **Upper Room** of **Epiphany House** at the **PFMC**, and enjoy browsing through them. Many memories will return to your heart. The same is true of our **PFMC** files and the recently acquired **KARMINSKI** files on the early years of many of the worlds apparition sites from the 1980's and 1990's.

For *18 years* we have had faithful volunteers who have been there to help with religious activities, annual events, and in the *PFMC* operations at **129 Deerfield Avenue** and **61 Cooper Road**. No one has received a salary.

We have remained in Our Lady's mantle of protection and are grateful for so many years of being able to serve her and her Son.

It is now time to work more quietly and in intercessory prayer.

We want to take this opportunity to thank every person who has been there for us, and for Our Lady's work. **God Bless!**

OUR LADY of SNOW

A feast that commemorates the dedication of the church of *Santa Maria Maggiore* on the Esquiline Hill in <u>Rome</u>. The church was originally built by <u>Pope</u> Liberius, and was called after him *Basilica Liberii* or *Liberiana*. It was

restored by <u>Pope</u> Sixtus III, and dedicated to <u>Our</u> <u>Lady</u>. From that time on it was known as *Basilica S*. *Mariæ* or *Mariæ Majoris*. Since the <u>seventh century</u> it was known also as *Maria ad Præsepe*.

The appellation ad Nives (of the snow) originated a few hundred years later, as did also the legend which gave this name to the church. The legend says that during the pontificate of Liberius, the Roman patrician John and his wife, who were without heirs, made a vow to donate their possessions to Our Lady. They prayed that she might make known to them how they were to dispose of their property in her honour. On 5 August, during the night, snow fell on the summit of the Esquiline Hill. In obedience to a vision which they had the same night, the couple built a basilica in honour of Our Lady on the spot which was covered with snow. From the fact that no mention whatever is made of this alleged miracle until a few hundred years later, not even by Sixtus III in his eight-lined dedicatory inscription, it would seem that the legend has no historical basis.

Originally the feast was celebrated only at *Sta Maria Maggiore*. In the <u>fourteenth century</u> it was extended to all the churches of Rome, and finally it was made a universal feast by Pope Pius V. Pope Clement VIII raised it from a feast of double rite to double major. The mass is the common one for feasts of the Blessed Virgin; the office is also the common one of the Blessed Virgin, with the exception of the second Nocturn, which is an account of the alleged miracle. The congregation, which <u>Pope Benedict XIV</u> instituted for the reform of the Breviary in 1741, proposed that the reading of the legend be struck from the Office, and that the feast should again receive its original name, *Dedicatio Sanctæ Mariæ*.

FROM the FRIARS

There is a story of a religious sister who was often sad and struggled with bouts of depression. She often overworked to try and "ignore" these feelings, hoping that all the activity would enable her to hide from the pain she was experiencing. By the time evening came around, this sister was exhausted. There was another sister in her community who noticed her sadness and thought and prayed on how she could comfort her sister. But it was always after Compline that she noticed this. (Compline is the night prayer of the Church, and in their community the sisters were prohibited from speaking with one another until the next morning.)

However, determined to comfort her sister, she stood in the hallway, waited for her to pass by, and instead of speaking, gave her the biggest smile she could. A few years later the smiling sister died. There was no one to greet this other sister with a smile, a smile which seemed to make her troubles vanish and enabled her to sleep in peace. The sister who was determined to comfort this other sister with a smile was Saint Therese of Lisieux, the Little Flower.

Oftentimes I think we become convinced that the only way to really help people is by donating a large sum of money to a third world country, adopting some refugee children, or doing something extraordinary that requires many resources or a large amount of time. Yet, let's face it, who has a large sum of money to donate or an extra amount of free time in their life? Since many of us probably do not, it is easy to become discouraged and start to believe that there is really nothing we can do.

This couldn't be farther from the truth. Ordinary life,

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with its ordinary people and its ordinary situations, is the "playing field" where all of us will grow in holiness, if only we are open and awake enough to see those who are around us. Daily life is sufficient for our growth in holiness; it is the soil where we can grow to become saints. The most important thing is to do whatever you are doing, to be wherever you are, but to do it and be there with great love.

There are no excuses. Everyone has people around them, whether it is family, friends, neighbors, coworkers, or just people we meet casually through the day at a store or in a parking lot, who are hurting and are in desperate need of that love that Christ calls us to bring to the world. And yet, the solution doesn't demand money, a certain intelligence, a lot of free time, or that you be an eloquent speaker. It can be as easy as a smile, a simple "hello," or "thank you," or even a sincere "God bless you" when you leave.

The other day, Br. Giuseppe and I spent our day off from the seminary in the library working on a paper and studying. After we both got tired we decided to go for a walk and admire the fall scenery that surrounds the seminary. About halfway through our walk, Br. Giuseppe turned to me and said, "You know, you don't have to be moving to be going somewhere." We stood for a moment in silence and I thought about how true it is. I think something similar can be said about holiness; you don't have to be an extraordinarily complicated person to become a saint—being an extraordinarily simple person is enough.

B e blessed Jesus, for the moment in which for the first time, You offered Yourself to the disciples, and You entered the lives of Your disciples in such a mysterious but real way. Be Blessed also in the name of those who receive You in the heavenly bread and the cup of salvation at the hands of Your Priests. Be blessed Jesus for those who nourish themselves spiritually daily with You and believe in Your real presence in the Eucharistic bread and wine. Be Blessed in all your ministers who offer Your body saying: "The body of Christ " and in those who reply "Amen"

Jesus grant that, by the strength of Your spirit, Eucharistic communion with You is always a meeting of love for every believer who receives You. I am sorry for every holy communion which I made superficially, and unworthy of You and Your love. That is why today I wish to show You more love, I wish to burn with an even deeper longing for You. Amen. I praise, bless and rejoice in You Jesus.

I adore You together all those who adore You with living faith. I glorify You together with those communities who adore you night and day. Bless them, Lord Jesus, and fill them with the Spirit of Adoration that their dwelling with You becomes a joyful encounter, that every heart which adores You can unite completely with You, that all those who adore may be one in You just as You are one with the Father and the Holy Spirit. I adore You also in those churches and oratories where Your people have forgotten You and left You alone. May your Spirit be poured out on those Parish communities where souls have not yet woken up to Adoration. They will come and adore You when You release Your spirit, when the Spirit leads Your faithful into the mystery of Your presence.

I adore You in the name of all those who have forgotten You!

The Meaning and Value of Eucharistic Adoration

When the faithful adore Christ present in the sacrament, they should remember that his presence derives from the sacrifice and is directed towards both sacramental and spiritual communion" (Sacred Congregation of Rites, Instruction on the Worship of the Eucharistic Mystery, n. 50). I therefore encourage Christians regularly to visit Christ present in the Blessed Sacrament of the altar, for we are all called to abide in the presence of God, thanks to him who is with us until the end of time. In contemplation, Christians will perceive ever more profoundly that the paschal mystery is at the heart of all Christian life. This practice leads them to join more intensely in the paschal mystery and to make the Eucharistic sacrifice, the perfect gift, the centre of their life in accordance with their specific vocation, for it "confers and incomparable dignity upon the Christian people" (Paul VI, Mysterium Fidei, n. 67); in fact, during the Eucharist, we are welcomed by Christ, we receive his forgiveness, we are nourished by his word and his bread, we are then sent out on mission in the world; thus each one is called to witness to what he has received and to do the same for his brethren. The faithful strengthen their hope by discovering that with Christ suffering and distress can be transfigured, for with him we have already returned from death to life. As a result, when they offer the Lord of history their own life, their work and all creation, their days are illumined by him. I urge priests, religious and lay people to continue and redouble their efforts to teach the younger generations the meaning and value of Eucharistic adoration and devotion. How will young

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people be able to know the Lord if they are not introduced to the mystery of his presence? Like the young Samuel, by learning the words of the prayer of the heart, they will be closer to the Lord who will accompany them in their spiritual and human growth, and in the missionary witness which they must give throughout their life. The Eucharistic mystery is in fact the "summit of evangelization" (Lumen gentium, n. 28), for it is the most eminent testimony to Christ's Resurrection. All interior life needs silence and intimacy with Christ in order to develop. This gradual familiarity with the Lord will enable certain young people to be involved in serving as acolytes and to taking a more active part in Mass; for young boys, to be near the altar is also a privileged opportunity to hear Christ's call to follow him more radically in the priestly ministry. THE UGLIEST of ALL SIN

List the lie that is propagated with one object in mind to take away someone's character.

It is called character assassination. Denigrating other people is nearly always done in order to enhance one's own image by belittling someone else's.

These people get an evil satisfaction in knocking someone else from their pedestal, and it is always done deviously, it is never done to their face, and well out of earshot of those who know differently.

It is just as bad a lie, avoiding the truth, or uttering a half-truth in order to mislead others into believing the opposite, and then smugly convincing themselves that they have not told an actual lie.

To set out with either of the above intentions in order to take another's character away from him, is the ugliest of sins, because only God has the right to judge others.

The terrible problem is that the world mostly judges people that they do not know personally, by what others say of them, and it is mostly through the mouth of other's opinions that a person personally unknown to the listener, has his character deformed.

This being one of the ugliest of sins it should be the first to relate in the confessional, but it is the sine that is too often ignored as a sing by the perpetrator of malicious gossip.

In Paragraph 92 of Saint Faustina diary she is speaking as a religious when she said:

At those times when I suffer much (from others words), I try to remain silent, as I do not trust my tongue which at such moments, is inclined to talk for itself, while its duty is to praise God for all the blessing and gifts which he has given me.

When I receive Jesus in Holy Communion, I ask Him fervently to deign to heal my tongue so that I would offend neither God nor neighbor by it

I want my tongue to praise God without cease. Great are the faults committed by the tongue. The soul will not attain sanctity if it does not keep watch over its tongue. To paraphrase Saint Faustina as she continues to speak on the subject:

The tongue is a small object but it does a huge amount of harm. A religious who does not keep silent from criticizing others, will never attain holiness; that is, he or she will never reach the heights of heaven.

Let then mot delude themselves, unless it is the Spirit of God, one has to have purity of soul, a soul whose tongue is silent except when it speaks good to others.

Oh, what irreparable damage is done by the tongue! We cause a lot of harm to our neighbor with our tongue, but even more to our own selves.

When you engage in malicious gossip denigrating other people you are destroying the soul of the person listening to you as well as your own, because they foolishly then become involved in these malicious lies, and do irreparable damage to their own souls.

Saint Faustina went on to say: God does not give himself to a malicious gossiping soul, which like a drown in a beehive, buzzes around but gathers no honey. This type of soul is empty inside.

It lacks both the essential virtues and intimacy with God. I have seen many souls in the depts. Of hell for

She lost a god deal of weight and shed many tears, and the outcome was very sad. It was not the sward that did all this, but the tongue of another. O my silent Jesus, have mercy on us!

Help me O Lord that my tongue may be merciful, so that I should never speak ill of my neighbor, but only have a word to comfort and forgiveness for all.

The denial of my tongue. I will not give it the least bit of freedom; but in one case only I will give it complete freedom, that is, in proclaiming the glory of God. Whenever I receive Holy Communion, I will ask Jesus to fortify and cleanse my tongue that I may not injure my neighbor with it.

When I receive Holy Communion, I entreat and beg the Savoir to heal my tongue that I may never fail to love my neighbor.

What Saint Faustina was speaking about was "Good Name Assassins". That is those who indulge in character assassination, which is the ugliest sin.

And some who not only claim to be Christian, but put themselves forward as pillars of faith are carrying on character assassination at every opportunity.

This person has a type of cancer of the soul, which is far worse and far more dangerous than cancer of the body.

Because he does not keep it to himself but spews it out so that it poisons others souls as well as his own. He is in fact a murderer of souls.

A person that has this type of cancer is like the serpent spewing poison every time his tongue comes out, and worst of all with a smile on his face, for his enjoyment in life is destroying other people's good name, biding behind a mask of pretend sanctity.

I don't know of anything more ugly than I could warn people about, nor any sin more despicable, than these thieves of innocent people's good name and reputation.

An ordinary thief of material goods can at least some day make restitution.

But if one steals the good name of another clandestinely, so that the person with the good name doesn't even realize it is happening there is no possible way that his good name can be restored.

We are often aware of whom these people are, but propriety usually prevents us from naming them.

I think sometimes it might be better to name and shame them and maybe save other people from their evil intent, especially when we have the proof.

DAD'S VOCATION TREPIDATION

Question: My son graduated from high school and wants to be a priest, but his father is against it. He has always gone to church with the family, but my husband

isn't very religious. Whenever my son starts asking about religious orders or seminaries, his father always works in a snide comment about the recent scandals. And then he says he's just a kid and couldn't possibly decide on a vocation yet. I'm worried my husband will wear him down. He has always looked for approval from his dad. What can I do about my husband? How can I encourage my son?

Answer: Every vocation gets put to the test sooner or later, and it looks like God has a "sooner" in mind for your son.

You can be sure that husband won't be the only person who will express doubts about the value of a call to the priesthood today.

There will be the peer pressure of friends, and the criticisms of teachers, mentors, or other relatives. God allows this in order to purify and strengthen a vocation. Don't take it as an indication that your son isn't called.

But we know we can't ignore God just because following him costs us something. It would be an awfully weak sort of Christianity that looked to have the path laid out before us with no pain or discomfort. Not the sort of Christianity Christ would recognize.

Help your son look at this not with any anger or resentment, but with a spirit of faith that God wants these first steps to be more difficult, to strengthen his convictions about what is most important. Every day in the priesthood we have to renew our sense that the cross is the way we help save souls.

There is no shortcut.

Ideally, you want your son to go with his father's blessing, but it is possible that despite your best efforts, your son will have to face some of the hard truths of the Gospel- that following Christ can mean leaving people and things we love behind because Christ is the most important thing in life.

Regarding his age, of course it is hard to know for sure at 18 if God is really calling. That's why the Church mandates a good number of years of formation before one takes on the life commitments the priesthood entails.

The best thing you can do for your son is to keep encouraging him to live in accord with his probable calling: keep up a good prayer life, frequent or daily reception of the Eucharist, regular confession, and live with a healthy caution about the dangers and' temptations that a young person today can face. Have him stay involved in some work for the Church - in a parish youth group, evangelization, missions, etc.

Your biggest and most important job will be your prayer and your sacrifice. Your son needs someone backing him up spiritually all the way, and probably God has put you in that role.

And don't write off your husband, either.

Sometimes men have strange ways of wrestling with something in their conscience. He may very well know deep down that what your son wants is good, but just can't come around to accept the implications of what it means. Maybe he feels pushed to come to grips with the fact that God is calling him to change, to take his own faith more seriously - and so far he finds it easier to hide behind some easy put-downs and not deal with it directly.

To help your husband, you'll need to deepen your level of communication and your overall relationship.

Maybe the Church's recent history affected his faith, all of us have struggled with the shock of the scandal. We all have to remind ourselves of the full story of the priesthood.

Maybe a quick review of Pope John Paul II's life, or remembering the outpouring of love at his funeral will help.

There are thousands upon thousands of happy, devoted, saintly priests who every day go out and work for the Church without thinking of themselves, and witness to the power and love of the Lord, often in heroic circumstances amid great difficulties. If your son is attracted to the priesthood, that is the kind of priest he is aspiring to be and you should both be proud to encourage him.

No doubt your son has met some wonderful priests - you should get your husband to know them.

You need to be prudent, and definitely pray first, but do challenge his faith. Don't worry so much about getting him to "accept" your son's vocation. Rather, help him grow in faith. That's what he needs the most.

It might take some time and he may only come around slowly and deal with his demons in his own way. But every dad wants to be proud of his son, and there is nothing greater than having a son who gives his life to Christ and helps people get to heaven.

Nothing.

Have confidence. The Holy Spirit will be active in your husband's heart. Be a good partner to the Holy Spirit and let him work.

PRIESTS: SERVING GOD and SAVING SOULS

VATICAN CITY, DEC 7, 2005 (VIS) - In his greetings to the faithful at the end of today's general audience, held this morning in Saint Peter's Square, Benedict XVI addressed some words to participants in a congress being promoted by the Congregation for the Clergy, and to members of the Italian Association of Referees.

To participants in the congress marking the fortieth anniversary of the Decree 'Presbyterorum Ordinis,' who were accompanied by Cardinal Dario Castrillon Hoyos, prefect of the Congregation for the Clergy, the Pope said: "This conciliar document marked a stage of fundamental importance in the life of the Church, reflecting upon the characteristics of priestly ministry which conforms priests to Jesus Christ, the head and shepherd of His people. In His image and at His service, priests must give their lives for the glory of God and the salvation of souls."

The Holy Father then told members of the Bolzano and Florence sections of the Italian Association of Referees that their presence gave him the opportunity, "once again, to underline the value of sport which, if practiced well, can become the privileged vehicle for an incomparable message of hope, promoting a culture of respect, loyalty and serene coexistence."

Turning then to address Polish pilgrims, Benedict XVI recalled that tomorrow is the Solemnity of the Immaculate Conception of the Mother of God. "God," he told them, "chose her and preserved her from original sin, to prepare her to be the worthy mother of His Son."

REFLECTION on the MESSAGE of 12/25/2006

JESUS IS YOUR PEACE

In the Christmas messages that the Virgin Mary has been giving us, she has spoken about peace and called us to it: "Dear children! Also today I bring you little Jesus, who is the King of Peace, in my arms to bless you with His peace. I call you to be my carriers of peace in this peaceless world. I am bringing Jesus, the King of Peace, to grant you His peace. Put the little Newborn Jesus in the first place in your life. In a special way I bless you, little children, with a blessing of little Jesus. Let Him fill you with His peace. "

Christmas is the utmost manifestation of the love of God. "But when the goodness of God our Saviour and His love to man appeared" (Tit 3, 4). It is dew fallen from the sky at Christmas, tenderness raining from above.

Evangelist Luke describes that a great heavenly army joined the angel and praised God: "Glory to God in the highest, and on earth peace to men on whom his favour rests" (Lk 2, 14). With their song the angels express the meaning of what happened, saying that the glory of God is materialized through the birth of the Child bringing peace to people. In the biblical sense peace refers to a whole of all things, particularly to forgiveness of sins and the gift of God's Spirit. The biblical expression for peace is close to the expression "grace". The peace granted by God stands for much more than a mere absence or elimination of wars and conflicts among men. It stands for a re-established, peaceful relationship of a son towards God, that is, in one word, salvation. Justified by faith – an Apostle says – we are in peace with God. In this sense, peace is identified with the very person of Christ. "For He Himself is our only peace" (Eph 2, 14).

The Virgin Mary continues coming and bringing us Jesus just as she did when she came and appeared on Apparition Hill for the first time, with the Baby Jesus in her arms. Our Lady's words and presence are neither loud nor unusual or noneveryday. Her presence with us here and among us is hidden in the commonness of the human word and simplicity. God is revealing Himself in the commonness and simplicity of a child. Jesus remains with us dressed and hidden in the simplicity of the Eucharist bread. And it is precisely this simplicity where the omnipotence of God's love and closeness resides. This greatness and omnipotence is capable of creating new life and transforming the hearts of men. The words of Our Lady are nothing new or unfamiliar. They are a reminder of the wisdom and truth of God's word.

The Virgin Mary is full of grace and full of God. She has emptied herself completely in order for God to reside in her fully. She is all turned to God. Therefore, she speaks to us: "Adore Him in your hearts, choose Him, no on can grant you peace as He can, and you will have joy in Him." Let this happen in our lives every day, not only at this Christmas.

THE LITTLE KNOWN STORY of OUR LADY of LAUS

B enoite Rencurel was born in 1647, in a small French village high in the Alps, near the border of Italy. Benoite, a poor illiterate girl, became a shepherdess for a well-to-do family when her beloved father died when she was only seven. She was a gentle girl who devoutly prayed the rosary often but had a firm will and determination to do good. On the other hand she was quite an ordinary girl.

Benoite often led the flock to pasture at the Vallon des Fours (Valley of Kilns). There, one day in early spring of 1664, she noticed a beautiful lady with a child by the hand. Since they were near the limekilns, she asked the lady if she wished to buy lime. After a while, without answering Benoite's questions the Lady disappeared. The beautiful lady appeared for two months without speaking.

Benoite was so happy just to see the lady. Even if she was told to be humble and meek she couldn't hide what was happening to her for long. Very soon the authorities too got involved and curious people asked for an explanation. Her employer forbade her to go to the valley because people said it was not good for grazing. Although Benoite obeyed, the sheep went to the valley anyway! The employer decided to see about it himself, went to the valley and tried all day long but could not get the sheep out! Then he noticed that the sheep were as healthy as could be so he let Benoite take them there.

Eventually the judge of the district told Benoite to ask the lady who she was. The following day the apparition answered, "I am Mary, the Mother of Jesus. My Son wishes to be honored in this valley, but not on this spot." Then she vanished and did not appear again for a month.

A month later, while she followed the Avence River, Benoite beheld a dazzling light on top of the Pindraux rocks. She crossed a rustic bridge but the light disappeared. A delicious perfume pervaded the spot. Following the scent she found a little thatch-covered chapel of Notre Dame de Bon Reencontre (Our Lady of Happy Meeting). When she entered, she saw a bright light with the Virgin standing over the altar. Seeing the dust lying on the altar, Benoite began to remove it with her apron; but Mary stopped her saying, "Soon nothing will be wanting here – neither vestments nor altar linen, nor anything necessary for divine worship. On this spot I wish a church built, a privileged sanctuary, wherein many sinners will repent. Here I will often appear to you. Means will not be wanting, despite the poverty of the country people around you."

Every day Our Lady came to Benoite and guided her giving her the exact dimensions of the future shrine. But Laus Valley stands high up on the mountainside, entirely surrounded by wild and rocky hills up which no horse can climb. Mary, however, had said it was to be; and, with hardy good will, the pious peasants carried the stones up the mountain. And increasing numbers of pilgrims came to help. Some people donated building stones, others donated money. One day a roll of gold coins was found in the donation box even though the slot on top was not large enough for the roll.

As soon as the church was begun a miracle took place – the cure of a young man, son of a doctor of Gap, who had been ill from birth. During the first summer as many as 60 cures were recorded by officials. Stillborn infants when placed on the altar came to life and received baptism. Laus became a pilgrimage site for people coming from far away.



Our Lady continued to appear to Benoite every day for fiftyfour years. Often Our Lady appeared with the Infant Jesus; and many times she beheld the Divine Child in the Sacred Host. Our Lady showed Benoite heaven, and she received the gift of discovering all kinds of sin by

the sense of smell. The hidden secrets of many lives stood out clear as daylight before her. She was thus able to warn sinners who were encouraged to repent and to receive the sacrament of Confession.

While many believed Benoite, some sought to discredit her by accusing her of pride and hypocrisy. Strange as it may seem, her most bitter enemies were priests. Some of these went so far as to imprison her; but, after fourteen days spent in fervent prayer and without tasting food, Benoite was released. Her persecutors declared their doubts unfounded, -- the prison cell having been filled with the most heavenly perfume during all that time.

She became a Dominican Tertiary and suffered the stigmata for twenty years. No illness preceded her peaceful death which occurred on December 28, 1718. Despite the snow-covered mountains and Alpine glaciers, people from far off villages somehow knew of her death and flocked to the funeral. She was buried in the church at the foot of Our Lady's altar.

Seventy years after her death, a workman repairing the sanctuary dropped a marble tablet on the tomb. The tombstone was raised and a portion of the wooden coffin was found broken. The splinters caused a wound on Benoite's cheek from which issued blood as fresh and red as if she were still alive. When the lid was removed, the body was perfectly preserved. In 1854, the coffin was again opened, and Benoite's habit found intact, though of her precious body nothing remained except the bones. On September 7, 1871, Pius IX declared her Venerable, the first step to sainthood, and in 1893 the church was declared a minor basilica by Pope Leo XIII.

SURVIVING MISCARRIAGE

 \mathbf{S} tories of Grieving, Hope and Healing by Daria Sockey

Melanie Vogel had just learned she was pregnant with her second child. It was a bit earlier only 10 months old - but she had gotten use to the idea and was now felling quite happy about it.

Then, one Sunday morning, she began bleeding. "I knew I was losing the baby," she says. Then she discovered just how much that child already meant to her.

One in five pregnancies ends in miscarriage. Most of these occur during the first trimester, sometimes so early that a woman does not know she is pregnant and believes her miscarriage to be simply menstration.

Most miscarriages complete themselves without physical complication for the mother, beyond the need for some extra rest. Sometimes bleeding is severe enough to require medical attention.

Family and friends do not always recognize or validate her grief: "It seemed kind of weird to grieve over someone you had only known about for a week," says Melanie. I was so broken-hearted, but really felt alone in it. No one else was connected to that baby but me, so no one else was really grieving about it.

Fathers are often deeply saddened as well, even though they sometimes do not let on to their wives, for fear of upsetting them further.

For those in the midst of sorrow over a miscarried baby, faith is a rock of refuge (psalm 31:3). Melanie said her faith helped her see things in perspective.

"As a Catholic, you know there are worse things than death, and that we will be reunited to our family members someday," she says. "It was helpful to think of my baby up in heaven, still watching over our family and still a real part of our family."

Celeste Behe lost her eighth child at 20 weeks, and had to have labor induced. "At first, I was kind of numb," she says. It helped that her parish pastor assured her that the baby was in God's hands, and that the delivery went well. "I felt that God was trying to make it all as easy as possible for me." A few days later, when she was feeling the loss more keenly, a friend s remark was of great comfort: "She said, 'You are sharing in Our Lady's sorrows she lost her son, you've lost yours.' I had never before thought I had much in common with Mary. I felt, wow, suddenly we shared something."

Reflecting on it seven years and two more healthy children later, Celeste sees her experience as having had a positive effect on her spiritually.

"I was strengthened. Prior to the miscarriage, I had always worried about something awful happening, and how I could possibly live through it," "Something did ... and I lived. I'm normally such a weakling, but God handled it for me. Now I no longer dread things the way I used to. When Helen and Gerard were born, I was so much more appreciative of what I had. I'd hold them and say over and over," I can't believe you are mine, that really here.'

Today, mothers and families of miscarried children are doing more than ever to recognize and remember lives were created and loved by God.

Mary Livingston and her husband named the four children they miscarried. When her diocese offered a special Mass for parents who had lost their children to miscarriage or stillbirth were glad to attend.

"My husband, in particular, found that to be very comforting. I was surprised at how affected he was by these losses," says Mary.

Tammie Mitchell had six marriages in a row between 2001and 2002. She gave names to the last three. Twice Tammie found a recognizable embryo for burial.

Catholic cemeteries will usually allow parents to bury fetal remains, either on the existing grave of a deceased relative or in a separate area. (Obviously, parents should contact the cemetery management before doing this.)

A Mass and burial for their baby was a moving and meaningful experience (for Celeste and Mike Behe, their children, and a few close relatives.

"I wasn't yet ready to face other people from the parish, so the Mass was unannounced and private," said Celeste. There is a special liturgy for the death of young children. Its prayers speak of hope and trust in God's loving care for the child and the family left behind.

Afterwards, the Behes buried Charles Nicholas in their local Catholic cemetery. They visit his grave on occasion, (keeping the family aware of the sibling they will meet in eternity. Of course, with most miscarriages, the fetus is small, and deteriorates internally, so that a burial is not possible. And parents who would find a Mass or burial more stressful than comforting should not feel obligated to do these things.

Some parents feel the need to recover from the trauma and grief of miscarriage for some weeks or months, and, then, later on, remember their lost babies in a more serene state of mind.

Perhaps an hour spent alone in an adoration chapel, reflecting on the baby's brief life, and committing it entirely to the merciful love of Jesus, would be an appropriate way for a mother or father to commemorate their miscarried child.

Or the family might say a Rosary with the specific intention of thanking God for the baby's life, and asking for the grace to trust him now and always.

There are many ways to remember without obsessing about miscarried children.

Every Christmas, Melanie Vogel buys each of her children their very own Christmas ornament.

"This Christmas," she says, "I thought it would be neat to pick an ornament for the baby we lost, to acknowledge her as 'one of the kids.""

Another mom named her baby, and added its name to a decorative family tree that hangs in the hall.

Yet another simply makes a point of occasionally mentioning to the children the five other siblings who died before they were born just as Saint Therese of Lisieux sometimes mentioned her siblings in heaven.

"It's not that we dwell on it all the time," my friend says, "but we all ought to think about death once in a while, and remember now and then that we have other family members waiting for us, whom we look forward to meeting. I, think that's a pretty good, positive way to think about death."

ARE THEY IN HEAVEN?

You may recall parents or teachers long ago talking about Limbo, a state of natural happiness which the souls of unbaptized infants enjoyed.

Since baptism by water or at least desire was required to go to heaven, they had to go somewhere. That's true. But is it Limbo?

"Limbo was never a Church doctrine," says Father David Poulson, Pastor of Saint Michael's Church, Fryburg, Pa. "Theologians were just trying to figure out something we don't have revealed truth about."

He points out that there are separate liturgies for baptized and unbaptized infants. One expresses certainty that the child is in heaven. The other hopes and trusts in God's mercy for the unbaptized child committed to his loving care.

This doesn't indicate a separate state of existence for the two but it does acknowledge that "God didn't think it necessary to tell us how he had worked things out."

Popularly, deceased unborn children are often described as "angels in heaven." That can't be right. Angels are real beings, spirit creatures without bodies. Human beings are body and spirit living or awaiting the final resurrection.

But the popular phrase may be onto something. The Catechism of the Catholic Church teaches: "Indeed, the great mercy of God who desires that all men should be saved, and Jesus' tenderness toward children allow us to hope that there is a way of salvation for children who have died without Baptism" (No. 1261).

In *The Gospel of Life* Pope John Paul II went further. He addressed women who had had an abortion, saying: "You will come to understand that nothing is definitively lost and you will also be able to ask forgiveness from your child, who is living in the Lord" (No. 99).

WHAT DO I SAY TO ONE WHO HAS EXPERIENCED A MISCHARRIAGE?

When a friend or relative has suffered a miscarriage, we may be at a loss for words. As with any other death, the point is not to be eloquent, but to be there for the bereaved, and acknowledge his or her grief. The tried and true, "I'm so sorry this happened. Is there anything I can do?" never fails to be the best response.

Whether or not the family requests any action on your part, it's nearly always a good idea to provide a casserole or other reheatable dinner, since Mom will usually need some rest after her miscarriage. An offer to take young children off her hands for a few hours will also help her with her recovery.

The mothers we polled also mentioned the things they did not want to hear within the first weeks after a miscarriage, even though these were not necessarily bad advice or untrue. Statements such as, "It's for the best," "Something must have been wrong with the baby," and "Don't worry, you're young and will have plenty of healthy children" may be true, and may even be what the mother admits to herself eventually.

But when the pain of a miscarriage is fresh, such remarks should be avoided.

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GOD DEFENDS the WEAKEST

VATICAN CITY, DEC 7, 2005 (VIS) - In the general audience held this morning in Saint Peter's Square, Benedict XVI continued his catechesis on the Psalms, speaking on Psalm 137, "a hymn of thanksgiving." Twenty thousand pilgrims filled the square to hear the Holy Father's words.

The psalmist, said the Pope, "raises his voice before the Temple assembly or, at least, having the Shrine of Zion as a reference. ... He sings before God Who is in heaven with His host of angels, but Who also listens within the earthly space of the Temple."

"The psalmist is certain that the 'name' of the Lord in other words His personal, living and active reality and His virtues of faithfulness and mercy - are the ... bastion of all faith and all hope. The psalmist's gaze then goes back for an instant to the past, to the day of suffering, when the divine voice answered the faithful's anguished cry, infusing courage into his troubled soul."

"Following this apparently personal premise," the Holy Father continued, "the psalmist extends his gaze to the earth and imagines his testimony incorporating the entire horizon: 'All the kings of the earth' ... join the Jewish psalmist in a common hymn of praise in honor of the greatness and regal power of the Lord."

The themes of this chorus of praise, the Pope explained, are "the 'glory' and the 'ways' of the Lord. ... God is clearly 'high' and transcendent, but He 'regards the lowly' with affection while removing the haughty from His sight. ... Thus, God chooses to

defend the weak, the victims, the smallest; and this fact is conveyed to all kings that they might know which option to choose in governing their nations."

The closing section of the psalm contains an imploration to the Lord for His help in the trials of life, and a reference to the wrath of enemies. "A kind of symbol," said Pope Benedict, "of the hostility the just may face during their journey through history."

"We must be certain," the Pope concluded, "that however burdensome and stormy are the trials that await us, we will never be left alone, we will never fall from the Lord's hands, the hands that created us and that now follow us on life's itinerary. As Saint Paul confesses: 'He Who began a good work in you will bring it to completion'."
